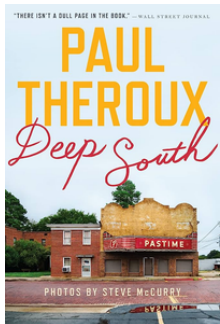


Evening Book Group

No registration required. Pick up a copy of the book the month prior at the Front Desk..



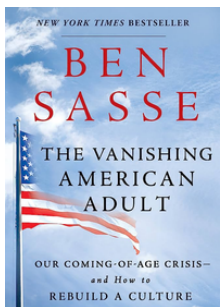
September 11th: Deep South by Paul Theroux

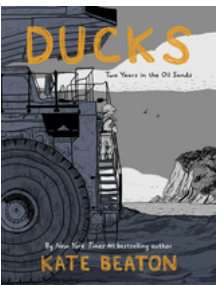
October 16th: The Woman in the Library by Sulari Gentill

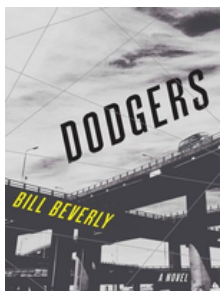
November 13th: The Vanishing American Adult by Ben Sasse

Sasse diagnoses the causes of a generation that can't grow up and offers a path for raising children to become active and engaged citizens.



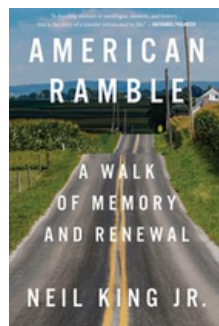
December 11th: Ducks: Two Years in the Oil Sands by Kate Beaton

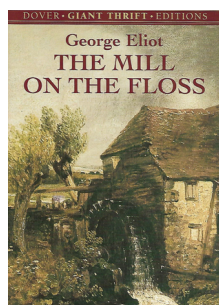
January 8th: Dodgers by Bill Beverly

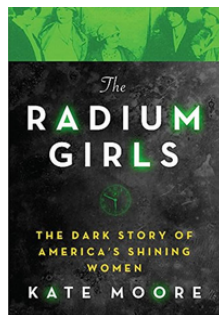
February 12th: American Rambles by Neil King, Jr.

Drawing on George Eliot's own childhood experiences to craft an unforgettable story of first love, sibling rivalry and regret.



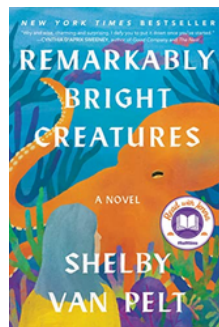
April 8th: Radium Girls by Kate Moore
